PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Transportation to Events

We appreciate our parents' efforts to get the children to the various events we do by transporting them there. Unfortunately, we are noticing that an increasing number of people are choosing to take their children and meet us at an event rather than come via school to pick up additional children. This meant that at last week's soccer tournament we struggled to have enough transport, and we didn't have enough room for the gazebo to shelter under.

The intention of having '*We will meet you at the venue*' on the permission slip was for those who live in or close Taumarunui to meet us there rather than travel into school then back to the venue; however, increasing numbers of people are choosing this option and bypassing the school to take only their children to the event.

We understand that some people are on restricted licences and therefore cannot legally take other children.

But can people in the future please help us a little more by offering the spare seats in their cars to transport our students to these events?

We provide petrol money for those who take other children to help with this cost. (Note that we are a bit behind on these payments as Karen has been on leave, but we are keeping a record of them and will catch up on this when she returns.)

We also only ask for parent help if we think it is an event that you would be interested in watching, therefore we use buses for things like the deep-water pool lessons. But if we were to use buses for every event we would incur substantial cost increases.

COOKING WITH KAHIKATEA

On Friday Kahikatea made corn tortillas with Whaea Regan. This started last year in Spring when we germinated the corn seeds and planted them in our mara kai. After a few months we picked the corn and dried it in the classroom. Once the corn was dried we picked all the corn off the cob. On Friday, Whaea Regan ground the corn in a blender and we mixed it with flour, salt and water. We left the mixture in bowls for ten minutes to soak in. Then we rolled the dough into small balls and squashed it flat. Whaea Regan put them in a sandwich press to cook. Once it was all done, we brought in the pot of cooked mince that Jonny had shared with us. Jonny had killed the pig with his Dad and minced it. Our corn tortillas were delicious!
