PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGES Year 8 Maths Results

You may have noticed the announcement on Sunday by the government around the teaching of maths in primary schools. Of concern was the following statement:

We have recently received results from the new Curriculum, Insights and Progress Study (CIPS). The results for mathematics were much lower than what we ever imagined.

- 22% of our year 8 students are at or above curriculum benchmark for mathematics.
- 63% of our year 8 students are more than a year below curriculum benchmark for mathematics.

My concern is that you, as parents, will be shocked by such data. I certainly am. But I need to clarify that these results do not align with the

data we have gathered in our maths tests last term.


We use a standardised test to monitor our students progress in maths, the Progressive Achievement Test (or PAT Test), in terms two and four. This is one of the two tests the government recently announced must be used to assess children's progress in maths twice yearly. Many of you will be familiar with this test as you would have done it when you were at school. However, it has been updated and refreshed since then and aligns with the current curriculum.

This test is standardised- meaning it has a standard method of being administered and has been normed against a national reference group of students of the same age, so that we can compare our students with other students to see if they are progressing at the expected level for their age. We then use this data to inform our teaching and to report to you via the student's individual reports.

In contrast to the government's data, our term two PAT maths test results (year 3-8) are as follows:

This clearly shows that the data that the government is using does not align with our testing results. You can be assured that your children are being taught mathematics well and are well prepared for maths at high school. That said, we continue to be happy to participate in programmes the government offers that support the teaching of mathematics or any other subject.

CLASSROOM KÖRERO –Kowhai

We have been busy bees in Kowhai so far this term. As usual, we have a heavy focus on our reading, writing and maths but are also learning some vocab about te marae and powhiri protocols, cross-country fitness, and the Olympics. This week we also have Harold from Life Education Trust visiting. We have been learning about reacting vs responding. The students have really enjoyed thinking about ways to deal with problems in a responsive way instead of being reactive.

We are delighted to have Raewyn Martin teaching in the junior room this term on Thursdays. Raewyn is a very experienced junior room teacher and is filling in for Jessica Walton who is busy at her winter job- ski instructor at Whakapapa ski field. Jessica will be returning for term four Thursdays.

On Fridays, Mr Starkey has been working on the science topic of electricity, with the children exploring how electricity moves in a circuit and trying to make a circuit to get a light to glow, using insulators.

In maths, he is working on measurement, at present they are estimating and measuring using non-standard units such as their thumbs, hands

and feet; next it will be the standard units of centimetres and metres. For P.E. we are training for the cross-country race. We have also been looking at the symbolism of the Olympic games, the flag and the torch.






