NGĀTI TUWHARETOA TAIOPENGA - KAPA HAKA FESTIVAL

Taupō Events Centre (next to AC Baths) – Taupō; Wednesday 18th September 2024

The entire school will be going to Taupō on Wednesday 18th September to support our kapa haka group in the Ngāti Tuwharetoa Taiopenga. We will be leaving Ōwhango School at 9:00am. Ōwhango School will be performing at 2:50pm. Please note this is a slightly later starting time from initially stated; unfortunately, the organisers have had to bump the schedule down 30 minutes. We apologise for this change; it was out of our hands.

We are performing at the Taupō Events Centre (next to AC Baths) in Taupō, and then we will be returning after our performance. We expect to be back at school by 5:00pm.

We will be travelling to Taupō on the Ōwhango Adventure buses and also some whanau transport. The students will travel over to Taupō in their full school uniform. We have kapa haka uniforms that they will get changed into at the events centre. Although we aren't on stage until 2:50pm, our group is allocated an hour to get changed and prepared before we perform. We are also going to watch other groups perform before getting changed and ready.

If you are going over to Taupō to support your child, please do not take your child away at any time. All students need to be with our school group for the entire day. Time moves quickly and the organisers are on a very stringent time schedule. Any latecomers will be a major problem.

Because we will be performing later in the day, we will take all the \overline{O} whango School students for a swim at the AC Baths, as soon as we arrive in Taupō. At approximately 11am. The tamariki can swim, hydro slide and then have lunch from 11 – 12:30pm. We will then go into the Taupo Events Centre and watch other kapa haka roopu (groups) perform.

It is very important to understand that our main kaupapa of the day is the kapa haka performance and celebrating, supporting and watching other tamariki perform. The swim at the AC Baths is secondary.
